Seventeen Romanian faculty and students, including 2 faculty and 1 student from Iasi, attended a 2-week seminar in Cleveland, on the development and integration of field education into the university curriculum. Several documents, including a manual in interviewing skills, were translated into Romanian and distributed widely throughout the country via the participants. This component of the project was funded both by World Vision and the Soros Foundation. However, Dean Dima from UI paid his own way to attend the seminar. He was the only faculty member to make such an effort, although the invitation was given to all faculties. A third component to CDROM involved social work skills training in Romania. Two seminars were held during June 1993--one in Oradea, serving the universities in the western part of Romania, and one in Iasi, serving the universities in the eastern part of Romania. Six trainers from American University in Philadelphia) conducted the training. Extensive training materials were translated into Romanian and distributed to all faculty and conference participants. She presented a colloquium about recent political, economic, and social developments in Romania and continued to stimulate faculty interest in the social institutions and the social problems of that country.

Also in 1993, Hildegard Puwak, formerly from the National Institute of Economic Research and currently the Minister for Reform in Romania, was awarded a post-doctoral fellowship at MSASS. She pursues her post-doctoral studies during the summer doctoral program.

In the summer of 1994, one team returned to Timisoara and spent 3 weeks conducting a re-assessment of child development and updating histories of families who had children with developmental disabilities. Results were shared with parents and agency personnel, who were trying to develop programs to prevent the institutionalization of children. As part of their work, the team participated in training on the prevention of child abuse.

A second team conducted several days of training for social workers who did not have a University education in family assessment and intervention as it pertained to social work. Following the training, American students were paired with Romanian social work students. Together, they went into the field to help Romanian social workers integrate family assessments and plans for intervention of families into their practice.

In the summer of 1996, teams of social work students/faculty, and professionals traveled throughout Romania to conduct community strength assessments. Teams were located in Bucharest, Iasi, Cluj, Timisoara, and Oradea. The purpose of the trip was to learn about local communities and the assets in those communities, as well as the tensions or difficulties that existed. Teams interviewed local leaders from social, economic, political and cultural sectors. Process and outcome recordings were used to collect data. One goal of the trip was to collect enough data to develop individual community profiles that could be used for future research, demonstration, and training projects. A second goal was to identify community leaders who could be potential collaborators with MSASS. In addition to this major effort, a community lecture was held in Bucharest and Timisoara about the adoption outcomes for Romanian children adopted to the United States. In Timisoara, students participated in a fundraiser for two local nongovernmental agencies.

In the summer of 1997, our mission was to: (1) train medical students, social work students, and ARAS volunteers (ARAS is the Romanian Association Against HIV/AIDS) in community assessment; and (2) collect pilot data from key informants (12 were targeted, 17 were interviewed) and pregnant women (12 were targeted and 11 were interviewed) about HIV knowledge, health behavior, and health services for people infected or at-risk of infection with HIV. The interview included an HIV Knowledge questionnaire and 3 stories that participants were asked to complete. Their responses to the stories were used to probe issues in greater detail. Students were paired together, so one could take process notes and the other could conduct the interview. Each student team consisted of a bilingual Romanian student, who served as a translator, while learning the techniques of interviewing and conducting community assessments. At the end of each interview, students summarized their findings. Interviews lasted from 1-1/2 to 3 hours with another 1 to 2 hours for summary recording. Each morning and evening, we met together to process the day, summarize what we had learned from the community, and review the next steps in the project. Students interviewed at least one person per day but often conducted two interviews per day. We worked on the project 4 days with 3 days each week spent learning about Romanian culture, history, and social life. At the end of the project, we did a summary, for the agency we worked with and for interested community members, about preliminary results that emerged from the interviews and their implications for program planning and program development. These implications included the interventions that seemed appropriate working with individuals in the community, as well as interventions for public education and program development.

A second team conducted a symposium on aging issues, visiting agencies that served the elderly and other at-risk populations, and built relations with NGOs in Iasi and Timisoara to support future collaborations.

In the summer of 1998, there were two projects. In the first project, students conducted an assessment of domestic violence in the Bucharest community. Interviews were held with women and key informants from the medical community. American students were paired together, so one could take process notes and the other could conduct the interview. Each student team consisted of a bilingual Romanian student, who served as a translator, while learning the techniques of interviewing and conducting community assessments. At the end of each interview, students summarized the interview. Interviews lasted from $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 hours with another 1 to 2 hours for summary recording.

The second project involved training social workers and health workers, who provided services to homeless women and street children. Students provided technical assistance to social workers and health workers, who provided services to street children to implement the training. During the second week, American students were paired with Romanian social workers and conducted interviews with street children. A total of thirty-six (n=36) children were interviewed at three different locations. Each morning and evening we met together to process the day, summarize what we had learned, and review the next steps in the project. A final

report with recommendations was sent to the participating agency in September.
